

How did we get to Oak Brook, Illinois?



ccording to Past International President Robert J. Uplinger, when Melvin Jones organized Lions Clubs International in 1917, Jones's own Chicago office on Michigan Avenue became Lions Headquarters. When the association outgrew that location, a building was purchased on North Michigan Avenue. It was an old building, dating back to

the Great Chicago Fire.

As time passed, the old building needed repairs and again the Lions needed space. During 1967-68, the board and officers discussed the matter. At the board meeting in Dallas, Texas (1968), action was taken to sell the old building. In the board meeting following the convention, and for several months following, efforts were made to halt the sale, but to no avail.

In the spring of 1969, the association tried to find a new location within the city limits of Chicago, but these efforts proved fruitless. There was a study made by Stanford University to find a completely new location for the headquarters. San Diego, San Francisco, Miami and New York were all recommended. After careful consideration, the decision was made to stay in the Chicago area.

Real estate agents recommended building west of Chicago. The Executive Committee commissioned then International President W. Richard "Dick" Bryan and Second Vice President Robert J. Uplinger to search for a site. Bryan and Uplinger flew over the area and located a tract of land near Highway 66. The next day they found that this land had been purchased by a hotel firm. Another search was started and this time the tract at 300 W. 22nd Street was located. The purchase price for the 9.1 acres was one million dollars. The Executive Committee secured the services of an architect to develop a suitable building. A contractor was hired and an application was made to the city of Oak Brook for a permit to build.

Vice President Uplinger was asked to work on the project because of his engineering background. Construction took place during 1970-71 and the International Board Meeting was held in Oak Brook that spring, as the building neared completion.

1971-72 International President Robert J. Uplinger was the first president to serve in our current building.

Thank you to Past International President Robert J. Uplinger for his valuable assistance and cooperation in compiling this information.

RE(IPE OF THE MONTH Santa's Chocolate Pizza

- 1 (12 oz.) pkg. semi-sweet chocolate chips
- 1 lb. white almond bark, divided
- 2 cups miniature marshmallows
- 1 cup crisp rice cereal
- 1 cup peanuts
- 1 (6 oz.) jar red maraschino cherries, drained, cut in half
- 3 tablespoons green maraschino cherries, drained, quartered
- 1/2 cup coconut flakes
- 1 teaspoon vegetable oil
- Melt chocolate chips with 14 ounces almond bark in large saucepan over low heat, stirring until smooth; remove from heat
- Stir in marshmallows, cereal and peanuts. Pour onto greased 12-inch pizza pan. Top with cherries; sprinkle with coconut.
- Melt remaining 2 ounces almond bark with oil over low heat, stirring until smooth; drizzle over coconut. Chill until firm; store at room temperature.

Tip: For individual pizzas, shape mixture into four 6-inch rounds or 12 4-inch rounds on wax paper-lined cookie sheets.
