LIONS EYE BAI REPRESENTATIVES MEET AT LCI

elen Keller said, "There is no better way to thank God for your vision than to give a helping hand to those in the dark."

On January 27th, 42 representatives from 28 Lions Eye Banks participated in the Lions Eye Bank Conference here at headquarters. In spite of adverse weather conditions, the participants came, as it was important to them to discuss issues facing their eye banks. One of the outcomes of the conference was the formation of a volunteer committee of seven Lions Eye Bank directors who will study and make recommendations regarding the feasibility of forming a Lions Eye Bank association.

There are more than 50 Lions Eye Banks worldwide that provide quality eye tissue for corneal transplants, research and education. The purpose of an eye bank is to obtain, medically evaluate and process eye tissue. When an eye bank receives notification that a death has occurred and the immediate family has agreed to donate the eyes, the Certified Eye Bank Technician (CEBT) drives to the location to procure the tissue. CEBTs are extensively trained to procure eye tissue according to strict Eye Bank Association of America (EBAA) medical standards. Because they may receive a call at any time of the day or night, the eye bank is staffed 24 hours a day, seven days a week with CEBTs. Once procured, the cornea is placed in a solution that will keep the tissue viable for 14 days. Transplants generally take place within seven days. When tissue cannot be used for transplant, it is used for research and education.

Often Lions volunteer as couriers to transport corneas for surgeries here or abroad. One of the most important characteristics of a Lions Eye Bank is that, if an individual needing a transplant does not have insurance or funds to cover the surgery, the Lions Eye Bank will arrange for financial assistance.

Lions Eye Banks report to the Program Development Department at the conclusion of a fiscal year. In 2002-03, Lions Eye Banks reported that they provided 23,935 corneas for sight-saving transplants and nearly 16,000 eyes for research and education.

March is "National Eye Donor Awareness Month." Lions and Leos will be providing eye donor information to community members. Compared to all other transplants, corneal transplants have the highest success rate: 90-95%. While the United States is not experiencing a shortage of quality corneas for transplant, there are many developing countries that do have a shortage. International outreach is another area in which the Lions Eye Banks are involved. Recently Lions in Georgia and the Central Florida Lions Eye & Tissue Bank provided a sight-saving cornea to a young man (age 17) in Ghana, West Africa, who plans to study medicine.

HINOW THI TO TAINTY

Quick Chicken Soup

3/4 lb cooked chicken cut into 1/2 inch pieces (2 cups)

1 cup frozen green peas

2 medium celery stalks, sliced (1 cup)

2 medium carrots, sliced (1cup)

1 medium onion, chopped (1/2 cup)

2 garlic cloves, finely chopped

4 cans (14 oz each) reduced-sodium chicken broth

1 tbsp chopped fresh parsley (or 1 tsp parsley flakes)

1 tbsp chopped fresh thyme leaves (or 1 tsp dried thyme leaves)

1/4 tsp pepper

1 dried bay leaf

1 cup uncooked gemelli or rotini pasta (4 oz)

- Heat all ingredients except pasta in 4-quart Dutch oven.
- Stir in pasta.
- Heat to boiling, stirring occasionally. Then reduce heat.
- Simmer uncovered 10 to 15 minutes, stirring occasionally, until pasta and vegetables are tender.
- Discard bay leaf and serve.

This year, Lions Day with the United Nations (UN) is scheduled for Friday, March 12, 2004, in New York City. This marks the 26th annual Lions Day with the United Nations, which celebrates our relationship with the UN Lions Clubs International has had Non-Governmental Organization (NGO) Observer status since the 1940s and is the only nongovernment organization with a permanent seat at the UN. Lions Day with the United Nations draws more than 500 attendees, the majority of whom are Lions. The day's program consists of several speakers, a luncheon with ambassadors to the UN and a tour of the building. For many, the luncheon is the highlight of the day; as an ambassador is seated at each table to dine and speak with the attendees. This mingling is a great way for Lions to learn about other countries and for the ambassadors to learn more about Lions. Another highlight is the award ceremony honoring the Lions Clubs International Peace Poster Contest grand prize winner. This year's winner is 12year-old Vittoria Sansebastiano. Vittoria will be traveling from her hometown of Novi Ligure, Italy to New York City along with her mother, sister, the president of the sponsoring Lions club (Novi Ligure Lions Club) and the district governor (District 108-IA2).
