

PEACE POST

ow in its 17th year, the Lions International Peace Poster Contest is more popular than ever. As past winners grow up (the grand prize winner of the first contest is now 30 years old), Lions asked the question, what are these "kids" up to now? Yuki Nakajima was 12 years old when she won the 1992 Peace Poster Contest. Still residing in Japan, Yuki is now 24 years old and is teaching the children in her kindergarten class to paint and draw.

"Drawing a peace poster gives children the opportunity to think about peace," Yuki said. "After I participated in the contest, I thought about peace much more. I felt distress concerning the [September 11, 2001] terrorist attack."

"The benefit of winning the contest is that my poster continues to convey a message of peace to children," Yuki said. "In the future, I

> hope that my children will be involved with art in some way. Now 23 years old, Niken Ayumurti Hartomo was only 11 years old when her poster won the 1993 contest. A recent college graduate, she is now a creative designer with an advertising and communications agency in Jakarta, Indonesia, and she hopes to attend the

Winning the contest in 1997 when he was only 12 years old boosted his self-confidence and encouraged him to pursue art as a career. He enrolled in an art school for high school and after graduating with honors, he moved to Japan to spend a year as an exchange student.

Once back in the Philippines, Don developed some of his own art exhibits and decided to major in fine arts at college. He hopes to be a full-time artist some day.

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BLT Bites

16-20 cherry tomatoes

1 lb bacon, cooked, drained & crumbled


1/2 cup mayonnaise or salad dressing

1/3 cup chopped green onions

- 3 tbsp grated Parmesan cheese
- 2 tbsp fresh minced parsley
- Cut a slice off the top of each tomato.
- Scoop pulp out of tomatoes and discard pulp.
- Place hollowed tomatoes upside down on paper towel to drain.
- Combine the bacon, mayonnaise, green onion, Parmesan cheese and parsley in a small bowl.
- Mix ingredients in bowl well.
- Spoon mixture from bowl into each tomato and refrigerate for several hours.

Tips:

- To save time and effort, use Oscar Mayer's "Recipe Pieces" bacon. It is sold in a pouch in the salad dressing aisle.
- To scoop out tomatoes, use a round measuring spoon (1/2 or 1 tsp size).
- BLT bites can be made the night before eating, but any longer than that may cause the tomatoes to become mushy.

"Winning the contest broadened my perspective on peace and also made me more actively pursue art. This contest helps children realize what is happening to the world and it allows them to help make the world a better place to live," he said. "It's difficult to achieve peace when there are people such as terrorists that don't want it to happen. However, the possibility of world peace is still there, and this contest can help."

Don has stayed in contact with members of the Taytay Pag-Ibig Lions Club, sponsor of the contest that he won. Through the years, he has judged numerous area Peace Poster contests.

Starting college this upcoming fall, 18-year-old **André de Villiers** vividly remembers winning the Peace Poster Contest at age
13 and the day he spent at the United Nations in New York City.

It was a once-in-a-lifetime experience for me, as well as my family. It also created many more wonderful opportunities for me!"

When he won the contest in 1999, André received a call from fellow South African Nelson Mandela congratulating him on winning the contest. Later that year, André delivered a speech at a local Lions convention. He has served as a judge for several local Peace Poster contests, as well as the 2001 international judging.

André plans to pursue a career in 3D computer animation for the film industry. This fall he will take several courses in Cape Town.

"This contest makes children sit down and think and put down their thoughts on paper. It is a long-term investment for peace," said André. "September 11, 2001 and the war in Iraq make competitions like this even more relevant."

Winner of the contest in 2002, **Hei Man Lau** still resides in Hong Kong and continues to draw and paint. Now 15 years old, she plans to attend college and possibly study art. She said winning the contest improved her self-confidence and inspired her to continue her art.

I visited Ground Zero when I was invited to New York and I understand that when people unite together for a positive good it can result in great accomplishments, but if the energy is used negatively, it becomes destructive," said Hei Man, who was in New York City for Lions Day with the United Nations only a few months after the attack on the World Trade Center.

Winning the contest also provided her with several opportunities. Through the recommendation of the Hong Kong Mandarin Lions Club, sponsor of the contest she won, she was invited by local organizations to design a logo and poster for a community charity event.

Winning the contest was a big moment for these five individuals, encouraging each of them to continue to share art with others and to strive for peace. Lions programs, such as the Lions International Peace Poster Contest, change lives every day. Fortunately each year this contest gains popularity and the number of children, school and youth group staff, relatives, friends and community members who have been inspired by this contest continue to grow.
