## LANDMARK CONVENTION IN DETROIT AND WINDSOR

his year marks the 87th Lions Clubs Convention. Even after nearly a century of annual conferences, the conventions are still definitely unique.

This year is the first time that a Lions Clubs Convention has been held in Detroit or Windsor. It is also the first Lions Clubs Convention to be held in two cities - let alone two countries - at the same time. These cities

will benefit from hosting such a large group. The Detroit Metro Convention Visitors Bureau estimates that Lions will contribute approximately \$12.8 million in direct spending to the metro Detroit and Windsor, Ontario region.

Lions Clubs began in 1917, with the first convention taking place that same year in Dallas, Texas. While most of the conventions have been held in June or July, the first convention was actually held in October.

It wasn't until 1920 that Lions Clubs went international. In March 1920, the Detroit Lions Club chartered the Windsor Lions Club in Ontario, Canada, taking the Lions "We Serve" philosophy across international borders. Interestingly, the Detroit club was chartered earlier that same year.

The Lions Clubs convention was first held outside of the United States in 1931 in Toronto, Canada. The last time a convention was held in Canada was in 1996 when Montreal, Quebec played host.

#### (Ibf 0t 111t **Great Granola**

- 3 cups old fashioned oats
- 1/2 cup pine nuts 1/4 cup sunflower seeds

(could also add 1/ cup

- 1/2 cup crushed pecans 1/2 tsp cinnamon
- 1/2 tsp salt
- of hulled green pumpkin seeds) 1/3 cup honey
  - 1/2cup raisins (or more)

1/2 cup flaked coconut

- 4 Tbsp unsalted butter 1/2 tsp vanilla extract
- 3/4 cup dried cranberries or cherries or blueberries or combination
- Preheat oven to 325°. In large bowl combine oats, pine nuts, coconut, sunflower seeds, pecans, cinnamon and salt. In small saucepan melt butter with honey over low heat, stirring. Add vanilla. • Pour butter mixture over oat mixture and stir to combine well. • Spread granola on large baking sheet and place in preheated oven. • Bake stirring every five minutes until golden brown and crisp for about 20 minutes. (Don't overcook since the granola will crisp more as it cools.) • Cool in pan on top of the stove. Add dried fruit once cool. • Keep in airtight container at room temperature up to one week.
